

Rev. C. H. Johns' Rites Tuesday In Fulton Church

Services for the Rev. Charles H. Johns, pastor of the Lowell Ave. Baptist church, will be held at 1 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist church, Fulton. Interment will be in Watkins Glen.

Mr. Johns, native of South Wales, came to this country in 1912. Since that time, he had served as minister in churches in the Middle West.

In 1930 he moved to Rhode Island, where he served the Warwick Central Baptist church, Warwick, R.I., for more than 12 years. In 1944 he became pastor of the First Baptist church of Walton.

In February of this year he accepted a call to the Lowell Avenue Baptist church and trusted to 80 Tompkins St. on March 5 to assume his new duties. He preached his first sermon as pastor there March 7 and was taken sick March 9 with a subarachnoid hemorrhage from which he never recovered.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Edith Knighton Johns, and one son, the Rev. Harold C. Johns, pastor of the First Baptist church, Fulton; a daughter-in-law, Doris, and two grandchildren, Charles and Larry. He has one sister, Mrs. John Thomas, of Stepaside, Pembrokeshire, South Wales.
