Arrest Three, Seek Two in Big Bill Theft

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(UP)—Secret service agents sought two missing links today to complete solution of the theft of \$160,000 from the government's heavily guarded money vaults on New Year's Eve.

With three suspects in custody and all but about \$31,000 of the loot recovered, the agents turned on the stear to determine if others were involved and to find the remainder of the money taken in the biggest robbery in the history of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

Three well-dressed Negroes, one a bureau employe with access to the vault, have been charged with the crime. One official closely connected with the investigation indicated others may be involved.

Secret service agents and local authorities were reported seeking two new suspects in nearby Brentwood, Md. Officers said they had been tipped that the two, said to be relatives of one of the arrested persons, had been seen spending and flashing \$20 bills.

Police Chief Fred Schatz of Mount Rainier, Md., said he had received information that the men were involved in the robbery and had "stacks" of \$20 bills.

Arrested and ordered held for grand jury action Tuesday were James Rufus Landis, 29-year-old bureau employe and decorated veteran of World War II, and his 26-year-old wife, Mamie Landis was held under a \$50,000 bond and his wife, who denied an active part in the robbery, under \$10,000.

The third suspect, 27-year-old William Giles, was to be arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Cyril F. Lawrence today. Giles, a government "flag-pole painter" who lives in the same building as Landis, said he and Landis stole the \$300,000 new \$20 bills because they "wanted to buy something for our kids."

Secret Service Chief U. E. Baughman said Landis named a fourth—a man—as the instigator of the theft. But Baughman said there are reasons to doubt this story.

Baughman said the secret service believes Landis sewed false pockets into the tail of a coat and slipped the money out of the heavily guarded bureau. The theft was discovered Monday morning when two dummy packages of blank paper were found substituted in the vault for the real money.

Baughman said Mrs. Landis' father, Irving Grant, who works on a farm at nearby Middleburg, Va., supplied the tip that led to the arrest of the three suspects. Baughman said the three had driven to the farm Monday night and left the bulk of the money—\$95,000—with Grant to be buried.

But Grant, who said the money was "forced" on him, became worried and called Virginia state police early Tuesday. Two state troopers recovered the money and notified the secret service. Landis was seized Tuesday morning while at work and his wife and Giles were arrested at their apartments in the afternoon.

Baughman said \$55,000 in \$20 bills and \$7,000 in smaller currency was found in a metal box left with Grant for burial.

Landis led agents to a dark corner of the bureau building where he had hidden another \$32,000 under a small hand truck. An additional \$1,500 was found in the Landis' apartment.

Listed As Dead

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(UP)—Thirty-five Michigan soldiers previously reported missing in action in Korea were listed as "presumed dead" by the army today.

Maj. Gen. William E. Bergin, army adjutant general, said the 35 were among the American servicemen missing for more than one year.

"In view of the lapse of time without information, to support a continued presumption of survival," he said "the department of the army must terminate such absence by a presumptive finding of death."

Bergin said the finding sets Dec. 31, 1953, for the termination of pay and allowances, settlement of accounts and payment of death gratuities.

Sanborn Rites to Be Thursday

Funeral services for Robert E. Sanborn, 43, who died suddenly Monday evening at Munson hospital following a brief illness, will be held Thursday at 3:30 p. m. from the Martinson funeral home in this city.

Dr. Howard Towne of First Congregational church will officiate and burial will be made in the family lot in Grand Traverse Memorial Gardens cemetery.

Mr. Sanborn was born on May 25, 1910, in Long Lake township and when a young boy moved with his parents to the Yuba area, where he attended grade school. He later attended Elk Rapids high school. On Nov. 17, 1955, he was united in marriage to Eud Scheets, the couple residing near Yuba until 1943, when the family moved to its present farm residence on the Peninsula.

A member of Cherry Center Grange, Mr. Sanborn held several posts as an officer of the organization. He was also active as a 4-H Club leader and for the past four years has worked with the Teen Age Square Dance Club of the Peninsula.

Surviving, besides his widow, are three children, Sylvia Mae and Robert W. at home, and Mrs. Yvonne Burbank, whose husband is in the service; his father, Wallace Sanborn of R. 3, one half sister, Mrs. Ruth Bahr of Muskegon; and one niece and several cousins. His mother, Mrs. Mary Sanborn, preceded him in death in 1928.
