### Commission Counsel Will Address League

Victor Lavine, assistant counsel to the Temporary Commission on the Courts, will address the League of Women Voters at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Niagara-Mohawk Power Corp. auditorium.

His talk on "The Family and the Courts" will be followed by a discussion period. League members and other interested persons are invited to attend.

A graduate of Harvard Law School, Lavine is a former editor of the Harvard Law Review and is a professor of law at Syracuse University. He is affiliated with the American, New York State and Onondaga County Bar Associations and has been a member of committees for those organizations, including a state bar committee on family law.

He will discuss recent developments in the area of court reform. The Temporary Commission on the Courts is a bipartisan body established by the state legislature in 1935 to study the entire state judicial system. It has sponsored hearings to encourage the bench, bar and general public to participate in its work. Among the commission's recommendations

adopted by the courts and legislature are establishment of the Judicial Conference, an advisory group of judges to study and make recommendations to improve court administration, and a system of Youth Courts.
