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on the moon," Dean Noble declared. "In the midst of this exciting change we seem to be unhappy in a quiet way. We appear to be afflicted with a kind of philosophical hypochondria mixed with psychological exhibitionism. Many of our recent plays illustrate this by showing a lot of distorted, maladjusted people. Actually, these writers and artists are trying to find new truths in the meaning of life. In their search, they are rediscovering the old landmarks affirming that these things abide, we cannot live in isolation, nations and men are inextricably tied together; that man cannot live by bread alone, he must have some point of cosmic reference, some context of faith if he is to transcend the frustrations and futilities of existence; that he must invest in something bigger than himself and must have a goal, an ideal to which he can "devote his life," emphasized the dean.

"We must never take life for granted if we are to continue to grow," said the speaker. "This university has never been static as the Post-Standard pointed out in this morning's editorial in its tribute to Chancellor Polley. "Education itself is in a state of flux," continued Dean Noble. "Colleges are being challenged by high schools as they expand their curricula so that higher education must upgrade its own programs. In universities we are seeing the importance of developing character, spiritual perception and social awareness along with scholastic training. "Nor must we take religion for granted. To do this is to take God for granted. Better a healthy agnosticism than a super-imposed religious authority. Religion stands beyond the reach of material things and through its impetus, prompts the young student into an awareness of the great mysteries as they plumb its depths for new vistas.

Senator Wise to Speak At Oswego Observance

OSWEGO—Speaker at the special Memorial Day observance for Oswego Town will be Senator Henry A. Wise of Watertown, according to George Demass Jr., town historian. The program will be at 11 a.m. Wednesday at Rural Cemetery in Fruit Valley at the grave of Dr. Mary Walker. In case of inclement weather the program will be conducted at Robinson Auditorium in the Oswego High School. Also speakers for the program will be Assemblyman Edward Crawford Jr. and Joseph C. Farrell, chairman of the Albany County Civil War Centennial Committee, representing the capital district. The Rev. Lawrence Draper, pastor of the Southwest Oswego Baptist Church, will give the invocation and opening remarks will be made by Demass. The Hannibal Central School band will play the National Anthem which will be followed by the introduction of the guests. Dedication of a wreath in memory of the Patriots of the Grand Army of the Republic will follow, assisted by the Veterans of Foreign Wars color guard and firing squad. The Methodist Church choir will also sing. Benediction will be said by the Rev. Robert Quigley, pastor of the Hannibal and Oswego Town Chapel. The Hannibal band will play and soloist will be Mrs. Lois Draper. This program is being held in connection with the Oswego County Civil War Centennial observance.
